Tips & Tricks for Newspaper Research

- Start with a broad search
- Begin with a surname, geographic location, and date range
- Add search criteria
 - Terms associated with who you are searching for
 - BOOLEAN operators: <u>https://libguides.mit.edu/c.php?g=175963&p=1158594</u>
- Watchout for OCR mistakes
- Wildcard searches: <u>https://apus.libanswers.com/faq/2235</u>
- If the newspaper in the geographic location and timeframe you are researching hasn't been digitized, don't be afraid to reach out to the local libraries, state archives, and historical societies to track down the newspapers you need!
